

Attendance

In their latest report, the Government have produced data which shows that more than 140,000 schoolchildren in England were officially "severely absent". According to official Department of Education figures, the number of these pupils, missing at least 50% of classes, is growing.

In May last year the Government produced a new document entitled 'Working together to improve school attendance.' from which we based our school Attendance Policy. A copy of the policy is available on the school website and at the start of next term we will ensure that all parents receive a summary version called Attendance Policy on a page. Our current school attendance is 93.1% compared to the national which is

Supporting pupils' emotional well-being



All children and young people have their ups and downs and experience all kinds of thoughts and feelings as they grow up. We have received training which has helped them to support children's mental health and well-being, by utilising emotion coaching. We will be encouraging children to ask for a listening ear if they are experiencing some emotional challenges. As parents, you can also let us know if you feel that your child needs some support.

School Uniform

Reading

We ask the children to read every day. The importance of daily personalised reading practise cannot be overstated. Recent studies indicate that when children spend 25 minutes a day reading suitably challenging books which they successfully comprehend then they will achieve optimal reading age growth.

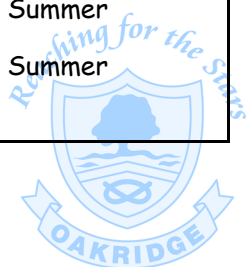
Spelling

Children will be working on learning their common exception words (orange words) and the spelling rules as outlined in the Year four curriculum. Each week children will have a focused spelling rule that they have been working on in class that will be set as a class assignment on spelling shed. They will be tested on this spelling rule the following week to check their understanding and retainment of those particular spellings. Sometimes children will have personalised spelling targets that will be set on spelling shed for them to work on at home.

What 'The Oakridge Way' means to our children



Year 4: 'It's about reaching for the stars and being the best person you can be, and being the best learner you can be.'

Home Learning

We appreciate how important the links between home and school are, and the need for us to work together to ensure a good education for your child. For home learning we will continue to re-enforce the basic skills associated with English and Maths. Each week the children will therefore be expected to learn spellings, read daily and practice quick recall of number facts.

In KS2 home learning will be outlined on a document in each child's individual file on BGFL. Electronic learning conversations, which are attached to the document will be used for children and teachers to comment. The comments will be checked by Mrs Charlton on Tuesday afternoon. Parents can also comment through this, or the contactus email if it is more appropriate.

Reading

Daily home reading - 20 -30 mins daily

Spelling

Spelling books sent home and assessed at least fortnightly

Mental Maths

On-going practice of mathematical recall facts such as + and - within 20 or times tables.

Subject learning

As part of our wider curriculum we may ask children to undertake supplementary activities to support the topic

Maths

The number facts the children are expected to know in year 4 are:

- All multiplication facts up to 12×12

Regular practice of quick recall of these number facts will help the children with their Maths learning. It is also important that when the facts are learnt, they are rehearsed regularly so that they are not forgotten. During June 2023 the children will take part in the Multiplication check where they are tested on their recall of facts up to 12×12 .

End of chapter Reviews

Children will continue to bring home their end of chapter reviews so that you can see the progress that they are making in each maths topic. It will also be encouraged that the children take ownership for their maths development by reviewing and reflecting and then practising any areas that they found particularly tricky and these can be practised in their home learning journals.
