Attendance

In their latest report, the Government have produced data which shows that more than 140,000 schoolchildren in England were officially "severely absent". According to official Department of Education figures, the number of these pupils, missing at least 50% of classes, is growing.

In May last year the Government produced a new document entitled 'Working together to improve school attendance.' from which we based our school Attendance Policy. A copy of the policy is available on the school website and at the start of next term we will ensure that all parents receive a summary version called Attendance Policy on a page. Our current school attendance is 93.1% compared to the national which is

The roots of the tree are the personal attributes we promote both around school and outside. These are: being kind, well-mannered, trustworthy and respectful.





Supporting pupils' emotional well-being

has helped them to support children's mental health and well-being, by utilising emotion coaching. We will be encouraging children to ask for a listening ear if they are experiencing some emotional challenges. As parents, you can also let us know if you feel that your child needs some support.

What 'The Oakridge Way' means to our children



Year 4: 'It's about reaching for the stars and being the best person you can be, and being the best learner you can be.'

Home Learning

We appreciate how important the links between home and school are, and the need for us to work together to ensure a good education for your child. For home learning we will continue to re-enforce the basic skills associated with English and Maths. Each week the children will therefore be expected to learn spellings, read daily and practice quick recall of number facts.

In KS1 home learning

<u>Maths</u> – Children are expected to practise their mental maths at home in the form of 'Minute Maths' strips. These are a list of questions (linked to the mental maths planet they are on) which they aim to complete in one minute. This doesn't happen straight away, however with practise at home they become more competent in the skills and get quicker and quicker. Your child will regularly bring minute maths strips home.

Reading – We expect your child to read for 10 minutes at least 5 times a week. The books are carefully linked to your childs reading attainment. This is another important skill in year 1 and a core part of their home learning.

<u>Spelling</u> – Your child will have a set of spellings (linked to national curriculum expectations) which are set via spelling shed online. These are also recorded in home learning books. Your child will be tested every Friday.

<u>Phonics</u> – As part of consolidating the phonics learning your child has accessed in class/preparation for the phonics screening check we may also set a small piece of phonics home learning.

We may also set small pieces of home learning linked to our learning focus that week.

End of Maths Chapter Reviews

Children will to bring home their end of chapter reviews so that you can see the progress that they are making in each maths topic and children can practise where necessary.
