#### Attendance: the top facts to know & share

A t the end of the Autumn term we contacted parents whose child's attendance was less than 90%. Any child who has an attendance figure lower than 90% is classified by the Government as being persistently absent, over a year this equates to 19 school days.



There are often very valid reasons why children are

absent from school and illness during the Autumn term is common and can result in a child's attendance falling below 90%.

From 8 January, Government is launching a national campaign to remind parents and carers of the importance of school attendance.

The link between attendance and attainment is clear:

• In 2018/19, just 40% of persistently absent (PA) children in KS2 achieved expected KS2 standards, compared with 84% of pupils who were regular attenders.

• And 36% of PA children in KS4 got 9 to 4 in their English and maths GCSEs, also compared with 84% of regular attenders.
